Be Safe on the Water

We all love to enjoy the river, but we need to remember to exercise caution.

Sadly, last Friday, a 20year old man drowned in the Llano at the James River Crossing. He was visiting his relatives in Mason. The Llano River at Junction is flowing at 122 cfs this afternoon while the North Llano is at 34 cfs. The last time it was this high over 4<sup>th</sup> of July was in 2010, when the Llano was 143 cfs and the North Llano was 74 cfs.

Downstream in Mason, the flows are 167 cfs and 184 cfs in Llano. As with Junction, flows haven't been this high since 2010.

Many of us likely remember the Bicentennial rains. Rainfall amounts over 12 inches were reported northeast of Pontotoc, sending a flood down Cold Creek and damaging graves in the Cold Creek Cemetery southeast of Field Creek.
